This year's meeting was especially important for the family of **Jerry** and **Carolyn Locke** of **Rodman**. Jerry's older brother, **John Franklin Locke**, **Jr**., attended for the first time. With John were his daughter, **Cathy**, granddaughter **Jennifer** with her husband, **Wayne Taylor**, and their kids, **Claire** and **Dillinger**.

At last year's reunion we learned that John had been diagnosed with cancer. It was wonderful to have him with us, and to hear his dry sense of humor. What we didn't know was that within three weeks, John would no longer be with us. He succumbed to his illness with his loving family around him on August 28th. John (1930-2015), was the son of **John, Sr.**, (1903-1963), who was the son of **Henry Jefferson Locke**, (1862-1937), whose father was **Josiah Henry Locke**, who died in the *Civil War*. Josiah's father was **Benjamin Locke**, who had moved south from *Halifax*, *North Carolina* with his father, **Josias Lock**, around 1800. John was still living on the original Benjamin Locke farm until his passing.

As I have said so many times in the past, these reunions are so important for us all. These are rare occasions to be together, and the personal interaction with each other is priceless, not just for the older family members who have so much to share, but for the new generation, who has so much to learn. When you have these opportunities, take advantage of them. None of us knows what tomorrow with bring.






Dora Boyce





John Franklin Locke, Jr.



Born in 1930 just as the Great Depression was beginning, John Locke knew what hard times meant, but he used those tough years as a way to learn how to succeed in life with very little. He came from good genes. His great-great-great grandfather Josias had moved his large family from the Virginia-North Carolina border region after 1800 to the rolling red hills of northern South Carolina near the great Catawba River. His greatgreat grandfather Benjamin Locke would build a successful farm just east of Chester, and raise a big family. Two of his boys would go away to war and never return. One was John's Great-grandfather, Josiah Henry Locke, who died at Petersburg in 1864. John's grandfather, Henry Jefferson Locke, was just two years old when Josiah died, and his mother, Dorothy White, would raise him and his sister, Mary Jane, on her own in very dark days after the war. "Jeff", as his grandfather was called, stayed on the family farm and built a large house for his wife and their ten kids. When John's father, John, Sr., grew up, he also stayed on the same farm, where John and his brother Jerry were born.

John would marry his sweetheart, Nancy Mae, after he was discharged from the Air Force in 1949, and the two would remain together on the family land for 66 years, raising three children, Cathy Locke Robb, of Rodman, Diane Locke Agustsson of New York, and John Franklin Locke, III, also of New York. When Nancy recently passed on, he told his daughter Cathy that her mother had gone first so she "could pick out that perfect fishing place for when he joined her."

John made a career with the Celanese Corpration of America, and worked at their Cel-River plant on the banks of the Catawba near Rock Hill until his retirement in the mid-1980's. The plant produced synthetic textile fibers and woven acetate fabrics for clothing, carpeting, upholstery, and draperies. For years Celanese was the largest employer in the county, but was shuttered and dismantled after 2005, and is now the location of parks and light industry.



John passed on August 28th, just five days before plans for a memorial plaza were unveiled at the sprawling Riverfront site, dedicated to the thousands of employees who spent their lives at the Cel-River facility.

In addition to his three children, John is survived by five grandchildren, Barbara Locke, Jennifer Taylor, John F. Locke, IV, Chris Dover, and Chrissy Locke, and four great-grandchildren, Claire and Dillinger Taylor, and Xander and Malachi Dover. His brother, Gerald Thomas "Jerry" Locke lives in Rodman with his wife Carolyn.

If there was such an award as "Best Dressed in the Locke Family", Bennie Wallace would have won it, hands down. As a career sales associate for the prestigious Ivey's Department Store in Charlotte, and later for Dillard's, who absorbed Ivey's, Bennie knew what was in style, and what the well dressed Southern woman was wearing. On August 29th, Bennie passed away in her home at the age of 91. Known for her bright blue eyes and incredible smile, she was loved so dearly by her family, her friends, and her work associates.

Bennie was born into a farming family near Waxhaw, where her grandparents lived. Her father was the late Furman Master Locke, and her mother was Sue Belle Winchester. She had an older sister, Irma, and an older brother, Furman, Jr., and they grew up playing along the railroad track in Waxhaw, along with two more brothers, Elvin and Arnold. Her Grandma and Grandpa Locke lived just down the road, and the Locke kids learned how to milk cows and tend the mule and the chickens at an early age.

When Bennie was a teenager, she moved with her family to the big city of Charlotte, and in 1941, she graduated from Oakhurst School in southeast Charlotte, just in time to see her brother Furman go off to fight in World War II. (Years later, yours truly would spend his first four years also at Oakhurst, and I'm sure that Bennie was as affected as was I when the historic school went up in flames in 1960.)





Bennie would marry the love of her life, James Conrad "Jim" Wallace, and they would have their son, David, who would marry Patricia, and have two beautiful daughters, Taylor and Jordan. Jim passed away in 1981, and Bennie dedicated herself to her work, and to her church. Until the end she was a member of Eastern Hills Baptist Church, and she was a mother figure to everyone who sought her counsel. She enjoyed working with clay and made many beautiful pieces that she often gave away as gifts. She kept a beautiful yard and garden, and prided herself in the meals that she would prepare for family and friends.



Here are her sister Irma, cousins Sadie Hope Boyce Flowe and Charlie Winchester, Bennie, and cousin Helen Boyce Hendrix, at the funeral for brother and cousin, Furman, in 2009. Irma and Charlie will be 97 their next birthday. Hope is 79 and Helen is 82. Cousin Locke Boyce in Jacksonville is 87.

Bennie's family has quite a history of longevity. Her grandmother, Sarah Elizabeth Campbell Locke, was 85 when she passed in 1942. Bennie's dad, Furman, passed in 1985 at age 95, and her mother, Sue, passed in 1991 just shy of her 100th birthday. Brother Furman was 87. Her Uncle Walston Locke passed in 1993 at the age of 97. Her Aunt Mattie Locke Helms was 83, and her Aunt Mamie Locke Boyce was almost 85. Her Aunt Sadie Locke Winchester was almost 80. They all had their mental faculties until the very end.





I always thought that Bennie favored her grandfather Lewis Locke (1859-1924) so much. Lewis was 43 when this photo was made, and the photo of Bennie was made in 2003. They both had piercing blue eyes, similar high foreheads and facial structure, and a similar hairline. In the Locke family, the apple never falls far from the tree.

Bennie especially enjoyed decorating her home during the Christmas holidays, and having the entire family over for special holiday meals. She had a wonderful sense of humor, and loved a good story or a good joke.












William Henry and Matilda Rogers Locke were the parents of Judson Adoniram Locke. The man in the hat was Matilda's father, Cornelius Rogers, and the woman in the bonnet was Matilda's mother, Elizabeth Anderson Rogers. On the right is John William Henry Locke, (1879-19 67), who was the son of Judson Lafayette Locke and brother to Rosa Lena Bunch.









Benjamin Franklin Locke was the son of James Henry Locke, as was Jesse R. Locke, shown with his wife, Alice Jane Johnson. Benjamin McCullough Locke was the son of Jesse Culp Locke by his second marriage to Margaret Fletcher Davis. He is also the great-grandfather of Burnice Harris of Mobile, Alabama, whose grandfather, Owen Thompson, was Benjamin's son with the black cook in Jesse Culp Locke's house. "Mattie" Rogers was Benjamin's wife.












