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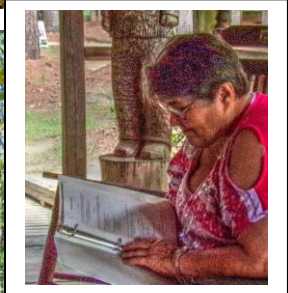
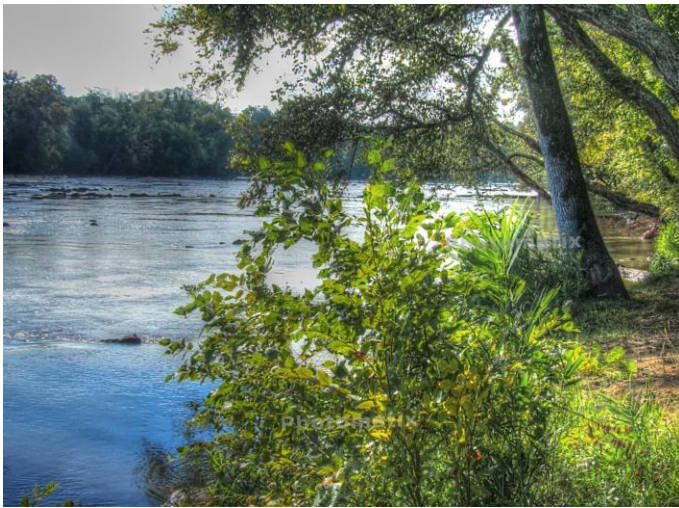

Native Americans had been using this ford for thousands of years. In 1815, the Landsford Canal opened on this spot so planters could move their cotton more easily toward the Port of Charleston.



The Locke Family Scrolls were displayed for all to study. Mary Emma Bunch explains.....



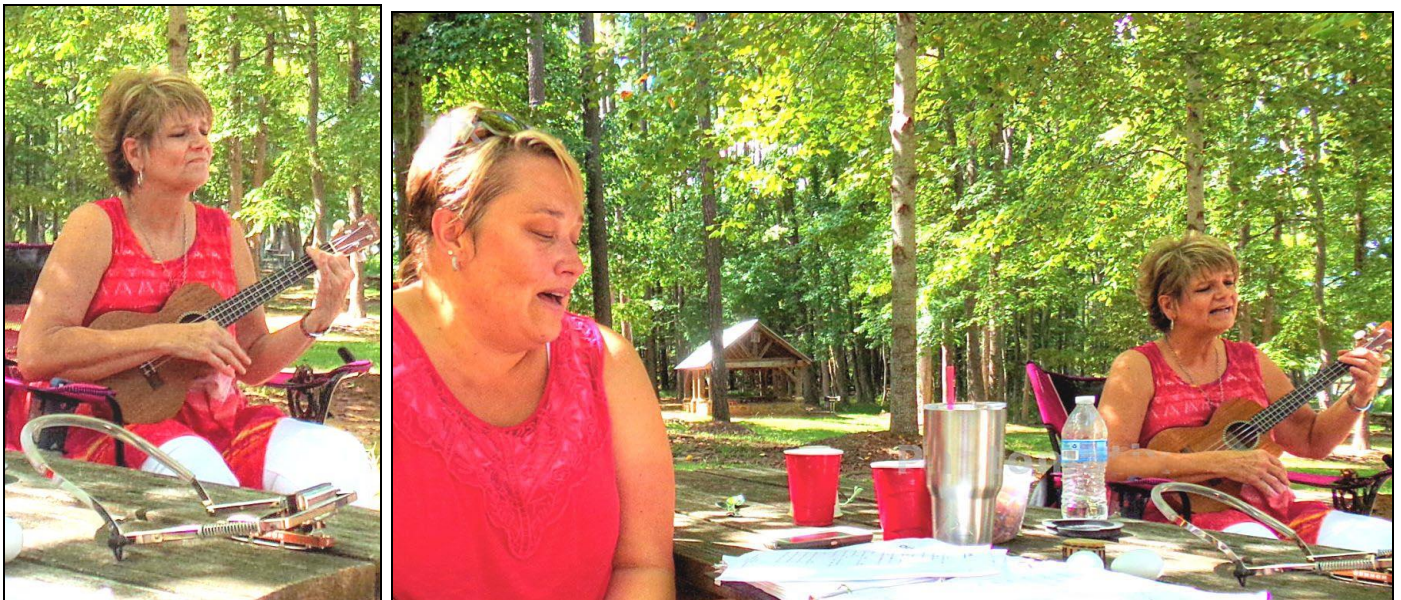
